Liturgy of the Word/Responsorial Psalm

Following the First Reading is the Responsorial Psalm. The Responsorial Psalm is sung or recited and is taken from the Old Testament, Book of Psalms. Although written thousands of years ago, the Psalms are still relevant today, providing a guide for prayer, and are also used in praying the Liturgy of the Hours. It is called Responsorial because it responds to the First Reading. The connection between the two can help the deepen the understanding of the First Reading. The Responsorial Psalm is an opportunity to reflect and prayerfully respond to the First Reading. It is also a reminder that we are all called to be participants in the Mass encountering God in the Readings and responding to him with gratitude and love.








FIRST READING

Colossians 3: 1-4

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Colossians

Brothers and sisters: You have been raised to life with Christ. Now set your heart on what is in heaven, where Christ rules at God's right side. Think about what is up there, not about what is here on earth. You died, which means that your life is hidden with Christ, who sits beside God. Christ gives meaning to your life, and when he appears, you will also appear with him in glory.

The Word of the Lord. R: Thanks be to God.

Psalm 90

R: If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts. (2)

You turn man back to dust, saying, "Return, O children of men." For a thousand years in your sight are as yesterday, now that it is past, or as a watch of the night. **R:**

SECOND READING

Colossians 3: 1-5, 9-11

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Colossians

Brothers and sisters: If you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Think of what is above, not of what is on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory. Put to death, then, the parts of you that are earthly: immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and the greed that is idolatry. Stop lying to one another, since you have taken off the old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed, for knowledge, in the image of its creator. Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcision and uncircumcision, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all and in all.

GOSPEL Luke 12:16 – 21

A reading from the holy gospel according to Luke Jesus told the crowd this story:

"A rich man's farm produced a big crop, and he said to himself, 'What can I do? I don't have a place large enough to store everything.' "Later, he said, 'Now I know what I'll do. I'll tear down my barns and build bigger ones, where I can store all my grain and others goods. Then I'll say to myself, "You have stored up enough good things to last for years to come. Live it up! Eat, drink, and enjoy yourself." "But God said to him, 'You fool! Tonight, you will die. Then who will get what you have stored up?' "This is what happens to people who store up everything for themselves but are poor in the sight of God."

HOMILY

PROFESSION OF FAITH

I believe in one God the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. I believe in one, holy, Catholic, and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins, and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.
